New Rector

The third advert for a new rector was advertised on the diocese website and the Church Times with a closing date of September 8th. Unfortunately no applicantions were made.

Meanwhile the Diocese have organised an event in Liskeard of 27th September when priests from all over the country are invited down to meet the diocese and understand our local ministry. Following this event they are invited to attend the Diocese Creation service at Bradoc.

Hopefully these events will result in a new Rector.

Without a Rector our services have been modified so that we now try and have one communion service each month, usually on the second Sunday.

The missing communion service is now replaced by Matins from the Book of common prayer book and we continue with choral evensong on the first and third Sundays at 6:00. Both led by a local worship leader.

Our week day worship continues to grow. The diocese has introduced an interesting initiative to grow younger, and this has a comparison of child lead worship across the diocese. St Mary Bradoc is in the top three churches. In 2020 the Church Army report God for Cornwall also identified us as in the top 5.

Our self supporting minister is also retiring in 1st November which may impact on some of our priest led services. However, where there would have been a communion service we will still have morning worship but lay led.

We have now moved from the Old Testament on to the New Testament on the big frieze.

Panel 5 looks at the incarnation

The Understanding Christianity frieze gives us an overall picture of the bible as one story which tells us about salvation.

Here we look at the purpose of the coming of Jesus. Why was it necessary. We saw in the Old Testament that the people of God continued to sin and so God puts his rescue plan in place.

This panel shows Jesus's path through the dark world to give us salvation, from his birth his journeys and actions right up to his crucifixion.

Can you spot the nativity scene, the shadow of the cross on his pathway and the crown?

Next time you are in church have a look at the Big Frieze and watch the explanation on the digital screen and see if you can follow the big story of the bible.

Growing Younger – a Campaign by the Truro Diocese to reach more Children in the Diocese

The Diocese has launched this initiative to encourage churches across the diocese to worship with children in the week as well as on Sundays. The proposal is for two equal objectives:

- 1. That every child and young person in the Diocese of Truro should be within reach of a worshipping community where they can be at home and within which they can explore a journey of faith
- 2. To increase by a factor of ten the number of children and young people who are young disciples within the church

They have chosen Bradoc as and example of a many stranded approach to children and their families in the community and school as described in the rest of the newsletter.

We worship with our school children with collective worship on every school day and with them and those who attend other schools through our afterschool clubs at school and church and weekly open the book and in do this with our friends from Connon Chapel.

Everyone is a volunteer.

What is perhaps surprising is that St Mary Bradoc is one of the four lowest population parishes in the Diocese yet we are one of the most active and successful in the diocese.


Care for our Earth prayer for Creationtide

A Fishy Tail (Tale)



In our North Transept which we use as a multipurpose refectory we have a strange carved panel. This was once the front of a choir stall or row of pews but when the church was reordered in the early 20th century it no longer had a use. With the recent reordering of the refectory, it has found a home in this chapel.

Its history is unknown. It is described by Pevsner and by Historic England as a folk panel with carvings in relief with people and snakes or serpents. It has been to exhibitions to show off the carvings.

It dates from about 1680 – 1780. We can determine that from the tricorn hats common in that period.

The strange thing however is that the serpents are in fact fish. They have fins. So why would there be a panel showing 17th century people and fish?




In the centre of the panel, we find three strange faces



We find fish with fins



We find missionaries





The people are smoking a pipe?



And blowing a horn, perhaps as a huer showing where the fish shoals are?



What sort of fish could they be?

Atlantic Cod grow to 2m in length. In the 17th century local fishermen started sailing to the grand banks for the summer, staying on the Canadian coast, catching and drying fish to bring back to Cornwall.

Our fish closely resemble them. At that time the fish they caught would have been mostly the large 2m fish.


In the winter they would then sail to Spain and Italy selling dried fish.

They set up camps on the shorelines and would have come into contact with the first nation people of the area.

Is this some form of record of the local fishermen from Looe sailing to the grand banks each summer?

Why would it be in our church which is not near to the sea?
